

A new generation of young African artists will show their work, inspired by social media and global developments, they present vibrant images in which they depict the worlds they live in in meaningful symbolism.

Boris Anje Tabufor (Cameroon, 1993) shows fictional balance in his paintings. Ori Huchi Kozia (Republic of Congo, 1987) presents the video Moudoumango, which integrates force, power of nature, myth and dream. Ori also won the Prix Orisha 2017. Patsheli Kahambo Kitenge (DRC, 1990) plays with symbols in his colourful paintings

representing states at war. Van Andrea (Republic of Congo, 1992) intermingles with loss of tradition and the force of the information age.



Pélagie Gbaguidi, Alex Mawimbi

Pélagie Gbaguidi (Benin, 1965) shows the installation Viendra la Fête, l’aire des horizontalités.

The equilibrium of power is a prerequisite for another society. Furthermore Gbaguidi shows transparent papers which were also shown during the Documenta 14. She participated in numerous exhibitions a.o. La Divine Comedie de Simon Njami (Frankfurt/Washington) together with Alex Mawimbi and Myriam Mihindou. Alex Mawimbi (Kenya, 1981) shows drawings which are the result of research into western museums and their African Art in ethnographic collections. In the drawings she engages with objects. She is the winner of the first Smithsonian African art award (2016).



Hervé Yamguen, Miguel Marajo, Myriam Mihindou

Hervé Yamguen (Cameroon, 1971) shows the delicate condition of the world and those who struggle to embellish this world in his drawings. Miguel Marajo’s (Caribbean, 1963) work depicts unconscious shapes from his imagination, he creates new drawings like a cord dancer. Myriam Mihindou (Gabon, 1964) shows a new drawing, Forestis, an amulet of protection which provokes the spirit of the forest to ward off natural tragedies caused by the elements as to encourage respect for all living things.
